# Attitudes About Abortion

**ABORTION:** *In the 38 years since the Supreme Court decided Roe v. Wade, pollsters have asked hundreds of questions about abortion. This AEI Public Opinion Study brings many of those questions together in one place. It shows how different pollsters have approached the subject.*

*Opinion on abortion has been very stable. Between 1975 and 2009, Gallup has asked the identical question on abortion more than 40 times. In 1975, 21 percent said abortion should be legal under all circumstances, 54 percent legal only under certain circumstances, and 22 percent illegal in all circumstances. Those responses in Gallup’s May 2010 poll were 24, 54, and 19 percent, respectively. This constancy of opinion is evident on many questions in this document.*

*Although opinion about abortion is stable, it is also deeply ambivalent. Americans are at once pro-life and pro-choice. On the one hand, substantial numbers tell the pollsters that abortion is an act of murder. On the other, they say that the decision to have an abortion should be a personal choice. Those two views are fundamentally contradictory, yet many Americans hold them within themselves. They see no reason to resolve the tensions in their own positions. They believe in the sanctity of life and in the importance of individual choice.*

*Most Americans do not want to overturn Roe v. Wade. At the same time, however, they are willing to put significant restrictions on abortion. Majorities of Americans favor notification of spouses, parental consent, and 24-hour waiting periods. They support first-term abortions, but oppose second and third trimester ones. They oppose public funding.*

*Ninety percent of Americans told Los Angeles Times interviewers in 2000 that they had never been active in the abortion debate. Between 1980 and 2000, in every presidential election, abortion was included in the list of issues people could pick as a top issue (or one of the issues for them) in casting their presidential ballot. In each of these presidential contests, these single-issue voters cast their ballots for the Republican presidential candidate. In 2004 and 2008, the exit pollsters did not include abortion as a category people could check as their top issue. In 2004, the Los Angeles Times did include the category “social issues such as abortion and gay marriage.” We have not included that question in this document*

**ABORTION AS MURDER:** *In 2000, the Los Angeles Times asked people to agree or disagree with the statement “abortion is murder.” Fifty-six percent of those surveyed agreed, and 37 percent disagreed. Those responses were virtually identical to the ones the survey organization got when they asked that question for the first time in 1989. The belief that life begins at conception may pull people toward the view that abortion is murder. In a June 2006, Fox News/Opinion Dynamics poll, 65 percent said that abortion ends a human life.*

*Although the questions have not been asked recently, questions asked awhile ago show that pluralities say they are personally against abortion, and separately, that they think the bad effects of abortion outweigh the good.*

**WOMAN'S CHOICE:** *The belief that individuals should be able to make their own choices shapes attitudes about abortion and many other things. Most Americans believe, for example, that smoking is a bad habit, but they also believe that people should be able to make their own choice about whether or not to smoke. Survey question after survey question that discusses abortion in the context of choice reveals broad support for the idea.*

**UNDER WHAT CIRCUMSTANCES?** *The Gallup question shown below has been asked more than 40 times since 1975 and the results are remarkably stable. Most people say that abortion should be legal only under certain circumstances (54 percent in Gallup’s May 2010 poll).*

*What are some of those circumstances? By overwhelming margins, American support legal abortion in the women’s health is seriously endangered, if there is a chance of a serious defect in the baby, or if the pregnancy is a result of rape. These are all situations in which the circumstance of the pregnancy is beyond a woman’s control. People are more divided in their support for legal abortion if the women is not married and does not want to have more children, or if she wants an abortion for any reason.*

*Q: Do you think abortions should be legal under any circumstances, legal only under certain circumstances, or illegal in all circumstances? [Starting in 1994, those people who answered “legal under certain circumstances” were asked another question asking them whether abortion should be legal under most circumstances or only in a few circumstances.]*

**VOTERS' VIEWS OF ABORTION, BY SUBGROUP:** *In 1992 and 1996, exit pollsters asked those people leaving the polls to check a box on the exit poll ballot that best represented their position on abortion. The results of those questions from 1992 and 1996 are shown below for all voters and for subgroups. Some findings are worth noting. Men and women do not differ on the issue. Those who actively practice their religion, no matter what their denomination, are more likely to oppose abortion than are those who don't go to church at all. A Protestant who attends church regularly looks more like a Catholic or Jew who attends church or synagogue regularly than that Protestant looks like another Protestant who doesn't attend church at all. An identical question was not asked in the 2000, 2004, or 2008 exit polls.*

In a 2008 Gallup question, 13 percent said they would only vote for a candidate who shared their view on abortion, while 46 percent said that a candidate's position on abortion would be just one of many important factors when voting, and 37 percent did not see abortion as a major issue for them. Other polls in this section suggest that around 15 percent are single issue abortion voters. Many election-related questions from 2008 regarding abortion lump abortion together with other issues such as gay rights. Some questions asked people which candidate they preferred on the issue. We did not include either of those types of questions in this report.*
